From Pastor Tuula

I started my ministry as a hospital chaplain and I've watched a lot of people die. If this subject makes you uncomfortable, you are not alone. It makes me uncomfortable, too. And there's a part of me that thinks that talking about death, something so obviously depressing, is the wrong move for a pastor. Ministers are often told that we should preach about happy things, and that if we don't, people will stop coming to our churches.

Maybe that's true. Most of the time I do try to preach sermons that focus on the good and hopeful parts of life. But if that's all I do, I'm doing a disservice - because my job as a minister of the gospel, is to tell the truth. And there is one big, uncomfortable truth we cannot avoid: sooner or later, no matter how we try to stop it or delay it, we are all going to die.

There's another uncomfortable truth as well. The old line about death and taxes really should say that there are two things you can be sure of in life: death, and the fact that while you live you are going to mess up. We are mortal, and we are fallible. These are the certainties of being a human being.

Lent speaks to both. On Ash Wednesday we receive ashes on our foreheads and hear the words, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." It's also a day when we repent of all the things that we aren't doing right. We confess our sins, and we say that over the course of the next 40 days we are going to try to do better. We are going to turn ourselves around, to set a new course.

We are mortal, and we are fallible—but we are not hopeless. We are not doomed. We are, in fact, claimed by something much larger than ourselves. Those ashes are a sign that we are claimed by God,

and if God lays claim to us, then nothing, not even our own mistakes or the end of our own life, will ever be enough to destroy us.

After we receive our ashes, we are invited to be participants in the holy season of Lent. We are invited into a journey of new life. The closeness with God that this season can bring doesn't necessarily come from giving something up, or even taking something on. It comes from this: the willingness to be marked as Christ's own and to find your hope in his story. The ashes are just a visible sign that you are ready to start a journey that can change everything. They are a sign of hope on our foreheads, a symbol of where we will put our hope during these 40 days.

Council Update

For the past several months, we have been blessed with a stream of new members. Participation in services, both in-person and online, are seeing an uptick. Through our communal activities we overcame the financial deficit which caused so much angst in November. These are fine accomplishments that we should be proud of. These illustrate a solidarity in purpose.



However, we need remember that many of the new members have arrived from St. Ansgar, Toronto and Grace, Oakville, ELCIC churches which closed. Declining membership and participation affect congregations' ability to maintain and support infrastructure and staff. The experiences here in Toronto are not unique and reflect a national and international trend. St. Philip's is not immune from these.

For the past several months, the Council has been consulting with specialists in Synod and other church-based organizations in an effort to plot a path forward that would maximize the use of our building and property, extend our outreach into the community, and provide additional finances.

We are currently exploring the possibility of renting our under-used basement to a day-care facility. There are a number of financial, space and diligence issues to be negotiated and resolved, and both the council and the congregation must approve any agreement. This is a short-term initiative. More details to come.

While these are challenging times, they can also be exciting times. On a related note, there are three vacancies on council that need to be filled. Would you like to join? Please contact Pastor Tuula.

Finance Update

Late last year I reported that St Philip's was in a financial deficit position of more than \$20,000. With that news, the congregation rallied and held several fundraising events in December including the auction which raised over \$6,000. This combined with individual donations allowed us to substantially reduce our deficit.

While the books have not been closed as of yet I am forecasting a near balanced budget which by all accounts is quite remarkable. More information will be made available at our upcoming **Annual General Meeting** scheduled for **February 25**.

Elle is the daughter of Cathy Grant and Carl Partington and the granddaughter of Martha Schafrick.





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


Lunch and Learn: Prayer
