From Pastor Tuula

When my children were young, Lent was intense around our house, primarily because I was working a lot and we all spent lots of time at church. To try to keep things straight I used to review the plans of each day over and over with anyone who would listen. During Holy Week this was especially important.

I was well into Easter Sunday, when my young daughter interrupted me. "Isn't Friday the day Jesus died on the cross? Why is that day called Good Friday?" "Yes," I said, moving into the topic of Easter outfits. She continued: "I don't think we should call it Good Friday!"


I tried to rack my brain for any recollection of why we call it Good Friday, recognizing that my daughter had a valid point. Why is such a bad day called good?

Later I did some research and found that we call it Good Friday likely because of the development of the English language over time. In Germany they call it *Karfreitag*, Mourning Friday, which seems to make more sense. In Finland, it is *Pitkaperjantai*, Long Friday. There was a time in the history of the English language when "good" meant "holy", which would make it "Holy Friday". Some think it was originally referred to as "God's Friday" and, over time someone added another "o". And then there are those who believe it is not an etymological issue at all but more likely a theological statement: great good came to be from the tragedy of that Friday.

That is what I told my daughter. I said that as Christians we believe Jesus demonstrated the ultimate love by showing us that some things are worth dying for.

To recognize that gift, we call the day Good Friday. She had a thoughtful response: "Well I guess I can see why they might call it Good Friday. But I think it's sad. Do you think it is okay if I call it *Pretty Good Friday*?" I told her that would be perfectly fine.



I hope this year you take time to attend Holy Week services and find moments of forgiveness, grace and hope during Holy Week, and especially on *Pretty Good Friday*.

Finance Update

The following is an excerpt from the Finance and Audit Committee of the 2023 Annual Report:

This, the first-year post pandemic, has seen an increase in general giving over the previous year of just over \$32,500 or roughly 14% with expenses increasing by \$29,389 or 12% over 2022. While general giving was \$6,971 shy of covering 2023 expenses, St. Philip's realized a surplus of \$10,082 as a result of rental and investment income (\$5,130 and \$11,923 respectively). Realizing this surplus is a remarkable achievement and is as a direct result of increased giving and fundraising activities of our congregation in the last quarter of the year.

As we move into 2024, council has approved an increase in our budget of approximately \$31,000 over 2023 as a result of mandated increases in salaries and benefits of \$13,000 and an increase in our Building & Property budget of \$20,730 to reflect increases in property maintenance, insurance and utility costs.

The total budget for 2024 has been set at \$295,000 and has been balanced by forecasting total revenue that is \$15,000 more than actual revenue realized in 2023 of \$280,000 this includes a 5% increase in member donations over 2023 as well as projected income of \$13,000 from investments and \$6,000 from rentals. The 2023 Benevolence Commitment to ELCIC has remained unchanged from 2023 levels of \$25,000.

In summary, while our 2023 financial position has improved slightly over 2022, to ensure that St. Philip's stays on this path in 2024 it will be necessary to stay within budgeted expenditures, see an increase of 5% in congregational donations and continue to realize investment gains while maximizing revenue from renting our building.

The 'more the merrier' - with more people we can sing 'bigger' music, the blend is wonderful, and the impact can be considerable. We are also looking forward to the post-Easter season and have chosen some other favourite pieces which I hope you will also like.
